Recent highlights:

- HSL will participate in Health Sciences Research Day on November 17 by hosting posters for both morning and afternoon sessions. Our doors will be wide open for the event.

- We've been challenged to cut around \$150,000 in journals and books as the HSL share of the \$1.2 million reduction for the campus libraries. The cuts will become apparent with the journal renewals for the calendar year 2017. - The HSL has received a new gift, the Richard and Tootie Burns Endowment. The gift provides \$10,000 for us to use this year, with an additional \$40,000 to place in interestbearing funds. I am working on a plan to update the HSL entrance area furnishings with the one-time funds available this year, including an updated look for the reference computers and the entry bookcase area. We will make a more official announcement once we have our plans for this year finalized.
- We've added a new walk-up scanner to the photocopy room, purchased with one-time RIF funds. It is easy to use, free, and output can be sent multiple ways.
- As a result of the discussion last spring, HSL staff will be working with Jon Stemmle on defining a strategic communications project. Since the HSL is part of the campus libraries, we are all working together to share news through a unified news feed. We are now sharing our digital monitor news with the Schools of Medicine and Nursing.
- New exhibit on third floor prepared by the HSL Cataloger, Amanda Sprochi: "In-Flew-Enza," provides an interesting view of the flu epidemic of 1918, and presents a snapshot of current flu research.
